Unit Description

Small group interventions for first generation college going students

Established Goals

- By the end of the 2015-16 school year, we will reduce the academic, discipline and attendance achievement gaps based on gender, disability status and socio-economic status by 5%.
- By the end of the 2015-16 school year, 100% of the freshmen and sophomore students will receive stress reduction and relaxation strategies individually, in small groups and in classroom settings.
- By June 2016, each counseling department member will be able to disaggregate math achievement data (both from classroom level and standardized tests) and create individual, group or classroom level interventions that will result in a minimum of 10% of identified students moving into the next highest math achievement category on MCAS (failing->needs improvement, needs improvement-> proficient, etc.) as compared to their grade 8 performance.

Students who complete the series of lessons in this unit will:

- · Understand what it is like to be a first generation student and the challenges that are associated with being a first generation student
- Know in more detail the specific components of the college search and application process and be able to complete the specific components (essay, interview, testing, letters of recommendation) necessary to apply to college(s)
- · Understand the financial aid process and be able to complete the necessary financial aid forms required for consideration
- Be able to use the necessary technology needed to research and apply to college and/or for financial aid
